President's Message

August 28 and the Fall Colors abound. We are aboard domed explorer car *Eklutna** on the Alaska RR McKinley Express train. Hardly an express train, it will carry twenty of these two level domed cars one hundred and forty eight miles up sixteen hundred feet from Fairbanks Alaska to the Denali National Park rail station in four and one half hours.

The lower level of each car offers a breakfast of scrambled eggs, sour dough toast, reindeer sausage and fresh coffee served on china over thick white linen. After breakfast we are not far from Fairbanks when we return to our seats on the observation level. For the ninety passengers on the observation level the views are unrestricted through a clear Plexiglas half cylinder covering the entire length of the railcar. The guide assigned to our railcar asks passengers to interrupt her milepost descriptions by shouting out the 'clock' position of animal sightings. 'Moose at three o-clock', 'eagles overhead at eleven o-clock', 'swans on the pond on the left side' come the interruptions, and passengers rise and extend their cameras to capture the sighting.

Directly viewed or reflected on mirrored pools populating the tundra, aspens are showing their golden leaves against the stunted green spruce and flaming red fire weed. The train will travel at times so slowly that you are tempted reach out from between the cars and somehow capture the colors waving in the gentle air wake made by the train's passing.

At times the elevation change requires the track and train to turn back almost onto itself in its climb such that you can see the train from its blue and yellow electromotive diesel to the last domed car. Overlooking the Nenana river canyon from the rail track ledge two hundred feet above we see eagles soaring in search of their prey, Dall Sheep on the opposite canyon rim, and rafters gliding over grey green and white glacier waters made into torrents by the boulder strewn river bed.

By the time we arrive at Denali National Park train station we have passed some points of historical interest as noted on the Alaska Railroad Mile Map. '*Happy* - Once the beginning of a narrow-gauge railroad serving remote mining districts to the north; *Mears Memorial Bridge* -The 700-foot steel structure, one of the world's largest single-span bridges; The Indian village of *Nenana* - It was a railroad construction camp in the early 1900s. Today it serves as a hub for barge operations, serving communities up and down the Yukon River and connecting waterways for hundreds of miles.'

We will re-board the McKinley Express to travel south to Anchorage two days hence after we explore the Denali National Park; the subject of my next message.

* Eklutna village is located at the head of the Knik Arm of Cook Inlet, at the mouth of the Eklutna River, 25 miles northeast of Anchorage. The area encompasses 6 sq. miles of land and 4 sq. miles of water. The Eklutna area was the site of many Athabascan Indian villages as long as 800 years ago. Today's residents are descendants of the Tanaina tribe.

Dr. Bob Botsch to Address the Academy at the January General Meeting January 9.

USCA Professor of Political Science Dr. Bob Botsch, will discuss the political impact of the 2008 National Election in Aiken County.

Bob Botsch received his BS in math and physics from N.C. State University in 1968. He then served 3 years in the military attached to the White House Communications Agency during the Nixon administration. He earned his Ph.D. from UNC Chapel Hill in political science in 1977. After a year at Illinois State University, he came to USC Aiken in 1978. Since 1978, Professor Botsch has authored three books, four online texts he makes available to his students at no cost, and numerous scholarly articles, book chapters, and technical reports. He was honored in receiving the USCA Outstanding Service award, the Scholarly Activity Award, and twice winning the Teaching Excellence Award. In 1988 he was named the Carnegie Foundation's CASE "professor of the year" for South Carolina and one of the top ten professors in the nation. He is a Carolina Trustees Professor and holds the Mary Grew Chair in American Studies. In his spare time he oversees the Social Science and Business Research Laboratory, which has been performing surveys in the Aiken County area since the early 1980s.
