President's Message

The Hubbard glacier advances to Yakutat Bay from its origin seventy-six (76) miles to the north on Mount Logan in the Yukon Territory. It is the longest tidewater glacier, meaning it flows to the sea, in Alaska. As its six mile wide face reaches the bay, tidal surges work to scallop its base and cause the upper mass to crack and fall or 'calve' away. Gravity works relentlessly to bring this massive monolith to ever lower energy states as it flows from mountain to sea.

The MS Veendam is 720 feet long and rises 50 feet above the waterline. The MS Millenium, a cruise ship of approximately the same dimensions appears as a toy boat in a bathtub as it draws near the distant blue and white wall of ice rising above Yakutat Bay. As the Millenium leaves the area, the MS Veendam slowly draws to within 1000 yards of the glacier, which now reveals its ice wall to be the height of a ten story building. The ship will maintain this distance away as it plies a course port side to the mammoth monolith. Where the glacier meets the shore, most of the ice is hundreds of feet below the waterline, and newly formed icebergs calved from below the surface can shoot up out of the water or into the hull of a ship too close.

Standing on deck in brilliant sunlight feeling a wintry like breeze in early September one looks out over a sea of small icebergs. They are shrouded by a low level layer of wispy vapor against a backdrop of dark shaded and snow covered mountains. Suddenly one's attention is drawn by a thunder clap and plumes of frothing water as the glacier calves a multi hundred ton tower of ice into the sea. As the ice wall breaks, tumbles, rumbles, ablates and slides into the sea one is witnessing four hundred years of history escaping from its frozen time capsule. plant, and animal deposits suddenly meet the water environment of the Yakutat Bay. Here these deposits are freed from the mighty glacier to be contained in small ice flow fragments. They will move on tidal flow to sea from the Yakutat and Disenchantment Bays through the Ocean Cape into the Gulf of From ice wall to ice flow to slurry to Alaska. sloughed particulate the glacial contents have been released to recycle through sedimentation, moleculeby-molecule, particle-by-particle into the ocean environment and thence to return via the many routes from the sea to recycle in the air current or on land.

Calving and ice melt are not the only means by which glaciers replenish the earth's vital needs. Glaciers comprise the largest reservoir of fresh water on earth. They slowly grind and reform the mountainous regions of this globe. Continually they exchange their surface of ice to water vapor, which is carried in the air currents to cloud and deposit life supporting rain upon this island in space. Witnessing the enormity of nature's force and breadth from the vantage of being in close proximity to the calving Hubbard tidewater glacier, one senses that we as humans are mere passengers on a toy boat in a bathtub.

Fred Humes to Address the Academy at the March General Meeting.

Our speaker on March 13 will be Mr. Fred E. Humes, Director of the Economic Development Partnership in Aiken. His presentation will describe the Partnership's view of present and future economic development for Aiken and Edgefield Counties.

Since joining the Partnership in 1990 over \$5.0 Billion and 11,000 jobs have been announced in the two counties. Mr. Humes has been recognized twice as the "Economic Development Practitioner of the Year" by Southern Business and Development Magazine. He was selected in 2003 as one of the Top Ten Economic Developers of the Decade by the same magazine. Mr. Humes chaired the Cluster Activation Task Force for the South Carolina Council on Competitiveness. Fred is a past member of the Board of Directors and Past President of the South Carolina Economic Developers Association (SCEDA) and Past Director of the Southern Economic Development Council (SEDC). He is a member of several civic organizations and is Past President of the North Augusta Rotary Club. Mr. Humes is Chairman of the Board of Directors of the South Carolina Hydrogen and Fuel Cell Alliance. He currently serves as a member of the Board of Directors of the Savannah River Regional Diversification Initiative, the Savannah River Site Redevelopment Authority, the Aiken County School to Work Consortium and various other

organizations. Most recently Mr. Humes has been recognized "Man of the Year 2008" by the Aiken Chamber of Commerce
